FOUNDER'S NOTE

NURTURING HEALTHY MINDS AND BODIES FOR RESILIENT FUTURES

As we reflect on the past year, we are reminded of the urgent realities faced by children and adolescents in vulnerable communities. The ripple effects of food insecurity, economic hardship, and mental health challenges continue to shape their daily lives. Yet, through adversity, we rest knowing that the power of community and collaboration will continue to support our drive for resilience.

In 2024, Lluvia Health took significant strides in addressing childhood malnutrition and mental health. Our food distribution program reached hundreds of vulnerable families, particularly young mothers and caregivers of children under 5yrs in urban slums, ensuring that those most at risk had access to food items for nutritious meals.

We also launched our Play and Thrive Project, an innovative project that integrates therapeutic play into pediatric healthcare for mental health promotion and protection.

Our pilot hospital playroom at Gbagada General Hospital provides a safe space where hospitalized children and children with chronic health conditions can socialize, express themselves, learn, and find joy even as they navigate difficult health challenges. Through cocreation with children, parents, healthcare professionals, and government agencies, we developed a replicable framework to bring play-based psychosocial support to paediatric healthcare in Nigeria.

None of these achievements would be possible without our dedicated partners, donors, and community members who share our vision of a world where every child can thrive, regardless of their circumstances.

As we look to 2025, we plan to strengthen our nutrition program by including economic empowerment for young mothers, ensuring that families have sustainable pathways out of poverty and food insecurity. We know that when mothers thrive their children have a better chance at growing up healthy, nourished, and emotionally secure. We also will be expanding our therapeutic play program to more hospitals and communities.

The road ahead remains challenging, but with your support, we are determined to expand our impact—strengthening nutrition, advancing mental health care, and making play an essential part of childhood for all.

NOTE TO ACCOUNTS

1 GENERAL INFORMATION

Lluvia Health Organisation is a not-for-profit organization founded on improving the health and well-being of children and adolescents, creating positive healthcare experiences, and nurturing essential life skills. Our mission is to ensure that every young individual has the opportunity to grow and thrive, while equitably accessing quality health services, proper nutrition, meaningful play, and vital life skills for optimal health and overall well-being.

It commenced operation in 2020 but officially registered on the 14th December 2016 with Incorporation number IT 93300

2. SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of these annual financial statements are set out below. These policies will be consistently applied in the future and reported where changes occur.

(a) BASIS OF PREPARATION

The financial statements of Lluvia Health Organisationhave been prepared in accordance with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) issued by the International Accounting Standards Board and IFRIC interpretations. These annual financial statements are presented in Naira and prepared under the historical cost convention with information and data provided by the owner of the NGO.

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires the use of certain critical accounting estimates. It also requires directors/trustees to exercise their judgement in the process of applying the accounting policies.

(b) REVENUE RECOGNITION

Revenue of the NGO represents donations from the trustees, donations from private companies and dontions from various individuals in cash, kind and use of facility. The organisation recognises revenue when the amount of revenue can be reliably measured and when specific criteria have been met.

(c) RECEIVABLES

Members paid their dues timely and regularly, hence there is no reveivables in the accounts.

(d) PAYABLES

Payables are recognised initially at fair value and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method. Payables are classified as current if they are due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

(e) FUNDS

This is the accumulated earning over the periods of operations.

(f) CASH AND CASH EQUIVALENTS

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand and deposits held at call with banks. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

(g) CONTRIBUTED USE OF FACILITY:

The Foundation receives donated use of facilities in form of office space from one of the trustee and member of its board.
